

Shake Siding

Shake siding is a type of siding that generally comes in two popular options.

- Staggered has an uneven, staggered edge created by shakes or shingles of varying lengths. This style gives a home a more rustic and playful look, and is often used on cottages and coastal homes.
- Straight shake siding is a type of shingle siding that has a clean-lined, straight edge. It can be used to add refinement to rustic styles or soften contemporary designs.

Here are some characteristics of staggered shake siding:

- Appearance: Staggered shake siding has a dynamic and textured appearance with uneven cuts, random wood-grain textures, and offset spacing.
- Profile: Staggered shake siding can have a jagged bottom edge that protrudes further from the wall than other panels, creating a bold shadow line.
- Installation: Staggered shake siding can be used for whole-house or accent applications.
- Style: Staggered shake siding is typically used on Craftsman style homes, while Cape Cod and Colonial style homes use a straight edge shake.
